Pun is the recipient of the Colorado Theatre Guild's Henry Award for Best Supporting Actor and New Dramatists' Bowden Award for his distinguished collaboration on new works. As an advocate, Pun started the AA Filmlab's Asian American 72 Hour Film Shoot Out, a shorts competition to encourage Asian American stories which has since been sponsored by companies such as MTV on a national level. He also co-founded the Asian American Performers Action Coalition (AAPAC), an advocacy group for Asian artists that publishes the only publicly available statistics on ethnic representation on stage. Pun also produces theater and film



through his company ZenDog Productions. He lives in NYC and just got a golden retriever puppy, Bodhi (which means "understanding the true nature of things" in Sanskrit). In his spare time, he volunteers at organizations like the 52nd St Project and serves on the advisory board of the Yale School of Drama.

AMELIA BELOVESICK, better known as Amy, is the curriculum development specialist for WPBS-TV in Watertown, NY. She creates digital learning materials for PBS Learning Media, PBS's national education platform for K-12 schools. She is a native northwestern Pennsylvanian from St. Marys, PA. She attended Clarion University of Pennsylvania, first as a music education major, but graduated with BS in elementary education. As a National Board-certified teacher, she spent nearly 30 years teaching in the same elementary school she attended as a child.



BONNIE COMLEY is a three-time Tony Award-winning producer and has won an Olivier Award and two Drama Desk Awards for her stage productions. She was recently re-elected as the Board President of The Drama League. She is a full member of The Broadway League and the Audience Engagement and Education Committee. Comley has produced over 40 films, winning five Telly Awards and one W3 Award. She is the founder and CEO of BroadwayHD, the world's premier online streaming platform delivering over 300 premium live productions to theatre fans globally. The theatre community has honored Comley for her philanthropic work; she is the recipient of The Actors Fund Medal of Honor, The Drama League Special Contribution to the Theater

He was featured as a finalist in the 2021 National High School Jimmy Awards. He makes his Broadway debut in *Kimberly Akimbo*.



TIM DOLAN moved to the Big Apple shortly after graduating high school to pursue a career in the arts. On the small screen, Tim was featured on Season Two of HBO's Boardwalk Empire. Onstage, Tim was the Dance Captain in the Off-Broadway revival of Once Upon A Mattress starring Jackie Hoffman and John "Lypsinka" Epperson. He also performed as Abraham in the long-running hit musical Altar Boyz. His other acting credits include the National Tours of Altar Boyz and Gentlemen Prefer Blondes as well as numerous regional credits. He is a proud member of Actors'

JESSE GREEN is the chief theater critic for The New York Times, having been the co-chief critic, with Ben Brantley, from May 2017 through September 2020. From 2013 to 2017 he was the theater critic for New York magazine, where, since 2008, he was also a contributing editor, writing long-form features. Before that he wrote about theater and culture for the Arts & Leisure section of The Times while covering broader subjects for the Times Magazine. His work has been recognized with National Magazine Awards nominations and a prize from the National Lesbian and Gay Journalists Association.

His books include *O Beautiful* (Ballantine) (1990) and *The Velveteen Father: An Unexpected Journey to Parenthood*, a memoir published by Villard in 1999 that was named one of the best nonfiction books of the year by The Los Angeles Times Book Review, one of the best



parenting books of the year by Child magazine, and winner of Lambda Literary Award for biography/autobiography in 2000. His short fiction and essays have appeared in many magazines, journals, and collections. *Shy*, his memoir with and about Mary Rodgers Guettel, the pioneering musical theater doyenne, was published in August 2022 by Farrar, Straus and Giroux. In a cover rave for The New York Times Book Review, Daniel Okrent called it "pure pleasure — except when it's jaw-droppingly shocking." The UK edition, the American paperback and an audiobook version will all be published in in 2023.

Before turning to writing, Green worked in the theater as a gopher, a copyist, and a musical coordinator on Broadway shows. With the novelist Meg Wolitzer, he has also written cryptic crosswords and other puzzles for several publications. He is a graduate of Yale College, with a degree magna cum laude in English and Theater.

PATRICK HOFFMAN has been responsible for running the Theatre on Film and Tape (TOFT) Archive since 2001. He oversees the production of more than 50 original documentation video recordings of live theatre each year and maintains close links between the Archive and the theatre community. He also sits on the Executive / Nominating Committee of the Outer Critics Circle Awards. Before joining the Library in 1993, Hoffman served as the Associate Curator of the Theatre Collection at the Museum of the City of New York. He has worked as an actor in professional theatre and has a BA in Theatre from the University of Missouri-Columbia.



DON ROY KING directed sixteen seasons of Saturday Night Live, winning eleven Emmys along the way. He is the creative director of Broadway Worldwide, producer of Smokey Joe's Café; Putting It Together, Jekyll & Hyde, and Memphis, all of which he directed for video. He directed the 2014 pro-shoot of Broadway's Romeo and Juliet. In 2001 he ended a fourteen-year run as the creative director of CBS News and director of CBS This Morning. He directed pool coverage of the first September 11th Memorial Service, talk show pilots, Good Morning America, several Barbara Walters Specials and two seasons of Kids Are People Too. Additional credits include the original cast versions of Tintypes and The Me Nobody Knows. He is credited with directing more hours of live network television than anyone else in the history of TV.

BroadwayHD.com's recent productions include: Lady Day at Emerson's Bar and Grill (Audra McDonald), Romeo and Juliet (Orlando Bloom), Cyrano de Bergerac (Kevin Kline), and Stephen Sondheim's Company (Neil Patrick Harris, Stephen Colbert, Pattie Lupone). The launch of BroadwayHD's streaming service in September 2015 introduced the world's largest collection of stage to screen content to the global audience. He is a six-time Tony award winning producer for A Gentleman's Guide to Love and



Murder, War Horse, Jay Johnson: The Two & Only, Thoroughly Modern Millie, Will Rogers Follies, and La Cage Aux Folles. He has been nominated for and received numerous other industry awards including four Drama Desk Awards, a Drama Critics Circle Award, Outer Circle Critics Award, a Drama League Award, and a 2013 Olivier Award for Irving Berlin's Top Hat in the West End. Mr. Lane is President and Chief Executive Officer of Stellar Productions International, Inc. and Stewart F. Lane Productions, Inc. Mr. Lane is co-owner and operator of the Palace Theatre on Broadway with the Nederlander Organization.

SUSAN E. LEE is the founder of the Broadway Education Alliance, Inc., a New York based non-profit organization dedicated to making theater arts accessible for children through authorized educational lesson plans, digital workshops, performance events and enrichment programming. With over 30 years of executive experience on Broadway, she is the architect of many crossindustry initiatives that have modernized Broadway's business and marketing practices. As the Chief Marketing Officer for The Nederlander Organization she launched Audience Rewards®, Broadway Direct®, the InTheatre Network® and The National High School Musical Theatre Awards, aka The Jimmys®. In 1995, she founded Camp Broadway®, Broadway's "original" summer camp,



for creative children to build confidence, hone presentation skills and discover their unique talents on and off the stage. Camp Broadway is the recipient of a Special Drama Desk Award for its decades-long work in building theater audiences and artists.

DAVID LINDSAY-ABAIRE is a Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright, screenwriter, lyricist, and librettist. His play Good People premiered on Broadway and was awarded the New York Drama Critics Circle Award for Best Play, The Horton Foote Prize, The Edgerton Foundation New American Play Award, and two Tony nominations. His previous play *Rabbit Hole* received the Pulitzer Prize for Drama, five Tony nominations, and the Spirit of America Award.
